

Pupil Premium Report to Parents September 2013

The Pupil Premium was introduced in April 2011, and is paid by means of a specific grant based on school census figures for pupils registered as eligible for FSM in reception to Year 11. For looked after children, the Pupil Premium was calculated using the Children Looked After data returns. A premium has also been introduced for children whose parents are currently serving in the armed forces. The Pupil Premium is additional to main school funding and it will be used by this school to address any underlying inequalities between children eligible by ensuring that funding reaches the pupils who need it most.

Objectives for Pupil Premium in Engaines Primary School.

- The Pupil Premium will be used to provide additional educational support to improve the progress and to raise the standard of achievement for these pupils.
- The funding will be used to narrow and close the gap between the achievement of these pupils and their peers.
- As far as its powers allow, the school will use the additional funding to address any underlying inequalities between children eligible for Pupil Premium and others.
- We will ensure that the additional funding reaches the pupils who need it most and that it makes a significant impact on their education and lives.

School Policy

The Headteacher and governing body have agreed a policy for Pupil Premium to guide the use of funds and to ensure that it represents value for money.

Accountability

The Head teacher and leadership team will regularly and rigorously monitor, evaluate and review the strategies we have put in place for Pupil Premium and report to the Governing Body on its progress and impact. A governor has been appointed to be responsible for Pupil Premium and impact.

Statistics

- In school we have 28 children who are entitled to benefit from the additional funding, as they are in receipt of free school meals.
- Each pupil receives £900 per annum.
- In the current year the school receives £35,100 in additional funds. This includes some funding for pupils who have been in receipt of free school meals in the last five years.

Strategy For Using the Funding

The school has identified the needs of those pupils receiving Pupil Premium funding and we have decided to use the following intervention strategies:

1. Additional phonics input to support PP pupils in KS1 in passing Phonics screening test.
2. Homework Club for PP children, to support completion of activities set, to a high standard.
3. Breakfast Club and Teatime Club free of charge for PP pupils (extended school provision).
4. Educational trips free of charge for PP pupils, including swimming lessons.
5. Extended School Clubs offered free.
6. Additional teaching and learning opportunities for pupils entitled to PP funding provided through trained TAs.
7. Providing additional training opportunities for staff in order to fully support PP children.
8. All our work through the Pupil Premium will be aimed at accelerating progress moving pupils entitled to PP funding to at least age related expectations. Initially this will be in Literacy and Numeracy.
9. Pupil Premium resources may also be used to target able pupils entitled to PP funding to achieve Level 3 at the end of KS1 or Level 5 at the end of KS2.
